	The children will explore the concept of creation through the exploration of a range of stories from different religions and cultures. They will investigate how important these stories are to the people who told them and how they reflect the time / place or beliefs of the faith or culture to which they belonged.	The children will explore the concept of holy through looking at how Mary, mother of God is portrayed in the Christian faith. They will look at a range of iconography and use it to look at how Mary has an important role in the Christian faith. They will reflect upon what their idea of holy is.	They children will explore the concept of freedom through the story of Moses and the first Passover. They will look at what is remembered in the Seder meal and why. Links will be made to how remembering makes them feel and how they remember special things or people.	Through the exploration of the Paschal candle in a church during Easter, children will identify what a ritual is, why they are used and what the value of them are in society and in religion. They will identify rituals in their own lives and think about how they can affect their lives.	The children will explore ritual through looking at Rites of Passage. They will identify what they mean to them and then through exploring the Jewish Ceremonies of Bar Mitzvah and Bat Mitzvah will be able to describe why these rituals are important to many Jewish children.	Children will explore the concept of wisdom through examining the story of Guru Nanak and other Gurus. They will explore what wisdom means to them and how it relates to their own life.

	Computer Networks and Word Processing Children will create a strong password and describe strategies for keeping their personal information private, depending on context. Children will understand that computers in a school are connected together in a network and why computers are networked. Children will create a fact file based on their topic work using shortcut keys to copy and paste images and text. They will spell check the text they add and explain the choices they made about their presentational changes to suit the audience and purpose.	Toy Giveaway Children will understand that any information about them online can be copied, created and shared by others. Children identify a range of technologies where bullying might take place and explain why they need to think carefully about how content posted might affect others, their feelings and how it may affect how others feel about them. Children will explore how Scratch can make objects move and transform using count-controlled-loops before programming their own objects using count controlled-loops.	Video Creation When searching on the internet for content to use, children can explain why they need to consider who owns it and whether they have the right to reuse it. Children can explain how using technology can be a distraction and suggest strategies to limit this time. Children will be able to sequence clips of mixed media, using images and videos, in a timeline and record a voiceover. They will be able to trim and cut film clips and add titles and moving transitions.	Fish Tank Children can describe safe and fun experiences they can have online and give examples of how they can be safe online and be respectful towards others. Children will explore how Scratch can use an indefinite (forever) loop in a fish tank scene and then use these ideas to design their own scene.	Crumble Lights Children analyse information and differentiate between 'opinions', 'beliefs' and 'facts'. Children will identify methods used to encourage people to buy things online. Using Crumble, children will use their coding knowledge to program and control a physical system in their D&T unit of work to program an indefinite looped light sequence in their lantern.	Stop Motion Animation Children will be able to explain how their online identity can be different to the identity they present in 'real life'. Children will create a simple stop motion animation using soft playdough or paper, based on a planned sequence of events.
