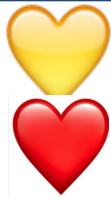

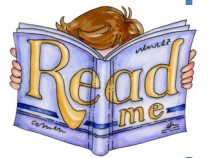
Walk to School Week and road safety

VE 80th celebration and remembering

Last week the school recognised the 80th Anniversary of Victory in Europe Day.
